MINUTES FROM MEETING HELD March 20, 2023

Tyree Goodlett called the meeting to order at 4:00 p.m.

I. Approval of Agenda

Members received and reviewed written copies of the March 20, 2023 agenda. The agenda was approved unanimously as follows:

II. Public Hearing – Materials Recovery Facility (MRF) Major Modification Solid Waste Management Plan Consistency Hearing.

A. Approval of Minutes – February 20, 2023

Members received and reviewed written copies of the minutes from the February 20, 2023 meeting. The minutes were approved unanimously as follows:

V. NEW BUSINESS

A. Financial & Operational Reports

1. Status of Accounts – February Dirk Verhoeff reviewed the status of accounts through February 2023. All revenues are above budget with the exception of MRF and landfill gas revenues. Dirk reported that the major expenses for the landfill development budget was the purchase of two leachate pump station control panels and construction QCA for the new landfill cell 6. Dirk also reported that the primary operations budget is within budget with the exception of materials and contracts and MRF operations (recycling). Materials and contracts is slightly above budget due to the purchase of aggregated for landfill haul roads and other site roads due to excessive rain. The second, MRF operations, is above budget due to contract staffing costs. The Board approved four positions for the MRF that was budgeted towards the wages line item. Once permanent staff are hired, the contract staffing expenses will end and the labor wages will come out of the wages budget.

2. Rainfall Report

Dirk Verhoeff reviewed the rainfall data through March 16, 2023. Dirk reported that the landfill received 114% of normal for January and 80% of normal for February.

3. Letter of Intent to purchase Aljon Compactor in 2024 Dirk Verhoeff presented a quote for a soul sourced Aljon trash compactor to be purchased in 2024. Due to the extended time to supply the equipment and rising costs, Dirk requested the Board approve submitting a Letter of Intent to purchase the equipment in 2024. This will ensure the price is fixed and the machine is available in early 2024. Mr. Jones asked if the older machine can be rebuilt from the frame up at a lower price. Dirk stated that he is not sure if Aljon by C&C MFG offers a re-build program. Dirk statews that the Authority has done frame-up rebuilds on CAT equipment with poor results. Dirk stated that garbage is much harder on heavy equipment than soil and that at 10,000 hours, operation and maintenance cost begin to increase significantly. Mr. Pennington aske what the trade-in price is. Dirk stated that the Authority was offered \$90,000 for their 2015 machine. Mr. Goodlett asked if the trade in value is good until we traded in the machine in early 2024. Dirk stated that the Authority will continue to run the machine and will receive \$90,000 in 2024 when we receive the new machine. Dirk reminded the Board that the Aljon machine has historically been the only machine to successfully operate in our waste stream due to the high percentage of carpet waste.

The Board asked staff to find out if Aljon has a rebuild program and determine timeline for rebuild.

A motion was made and approved unanimously, as follows, to submit a letter of intent to purchase a new machine in 2024 and to consider rebuild of existing 2015 machine.

 Dirk Verhoeff updated the Board on the Cell 6 construction progress. Dirk
 stated that clay liner is being placed and is passing all CQA testing. It is
 hopeful that the clay liner will be completed in the next month and the
 synthetic liner can then be installed. The progress is dependent on the
 weather.

During this school year we had an 8-month contest period from August 2022 to March 2023. Schools competed in one of 3 categories: Elementary Schools, Middle Schools, and High Schools. Schools competed against students of the same age and now have the chance to receive recognition before the end of the school year.

During this contest period 34 participating schools collected 372,950 pounds of recyclable materials, mostly paper, for an average of 17.8 pounds recycled per student. That's the weight equivalent of about 15 Hubble Space Telescopes and saves 322.51 cubic yards of landfill space.

Congratulations to the following seven schools for being part of the top recycling schools for this year! Recycling center staff will be contacting you regarding a prize. Certificates of recognition will be mailed.

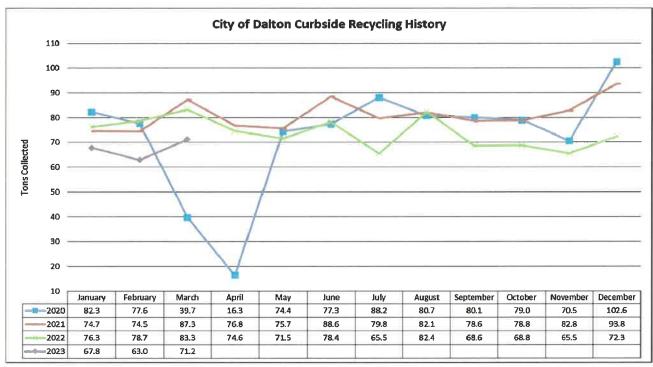


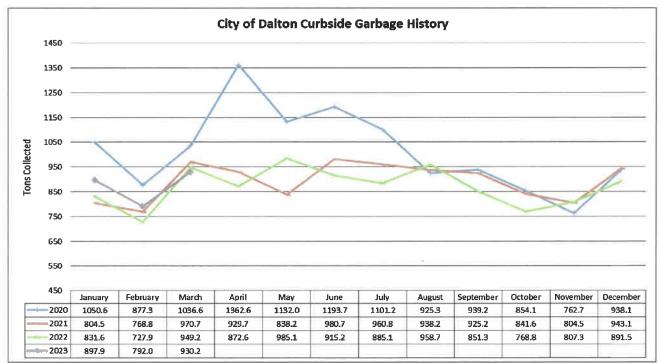
City of Dalton Curbside Recycling Report - March 2023

The City of Dalton Curbside Recycling Program collected 71.2 tons (142,360 lbs.) of recyclables in March 2023. It is a 14.5% decrease compared to March 2022 when 83.3 tons were collected. 71.2 tons saves 119 cubic yards of landfill space. 792.0 tons (1,860,420 lbs.) of garbage was disposed of in March 2023 by the City of Dalton. It is a decrease of 2.0%

compared to 949.2 tons collected in March 2022. The waste diversion rate for March 2023 is 7.11%. The Dalton-Whitfield Solid Waste Authority has credited the City of Dalton Public Works Department \$2,135.40 for the revenue sharing of recyclables received in March 2023.
